BISMARCK, ND – In statements on Thursday, Gov. Doug Burgum and the US Army Corps of Engineers reiterated their commitment to an evacuation date of February 22. They will not extend that deadline. Contractors working for the Corps will enter the camp as soon as possible.

NOTICE

"I urge all remaining individuals to immediately vacate the area known as the 'Oceti Sakowin camp site' so that cleanup work can be completed before the area is inundated with floodwater. The threat to the environment is very real and the situation is urgent. This is about protecting the land and the waters of the Missouri River from pollution from tons of garbage, human waste and other hazardous items. It's time for protesters to either go home, or move to a legal site where they can peaceably continue their activities without risk of further harm to the environment."
