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Water Resources Cost-Share

Drought Livestock Water Supply Assistance Program

The Drought Disaster Livestock Water Supply Assistance Program supports livestock producers facing water shortages due to drought. The program can only be activated following a Governor's Drought Emergency. [Learn More](#)

Emergency Community Water Assistance Grants

By the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Rural Development

This program helps eligible communities prepare, or recover from, an emergency that threatens the availability of safe, reliable drinking water. Eligible applicants include rurally located public bodies, nonprofit organizations, and Federally recognized tribes. Grants may be issued for sustained or imminent decline in water quantity or quality. [Learn More](#)

Emergency Conservation Program

By the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Farm Service Agency



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The Emergency Conservation Program, administered by the Farm Service Agency, offers financial and technical assistance to agricultural producers to repair and restore farmland affected by natural disasters such as floods, hurricanes, wildfires, drought, and other calamities. The Emergency Conservation Program helps farmers and ranchers implement emergency conservation measures to rehabilitate damaged land, restore agricultural production, and prevent further environmental degradation. Emergency Farm Loans

The FSA provides loans to producers to restore or replace essential property; pay all or part of production costs associated with the disaster year, pay essential family living expenses, reorganize the farming operation and refinance certain debts, excluding real estate.

Livestock Indemnity Program

By the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Farm Service Agency

Producers apply through the FSA for benefits if they have legally owned the eligible livestock on the day they died, or were sold due to injury, from an eligible natural disaster. The livestock must also: have died due to an eligible weather event and been documented as part of inventory and death evidence. Livestock must have been raised for, or part of, a commercial use in a farming operation. [Learn More](#)

Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees and Farm-Raised Fish

Producers, through Farm Service Agency, apply for numerous categories of assistance: monetary assistance in response to operational losses that are caused by natural disasters. As program continues to grow, the following portions are growing in popularity: grazing losses indemnity to cover the forage days lost, stored feed damaged by weather to provide partial value back, or to assist in costs to replace that feed, costs to deliver that feed to livestock, partial reimbursement on costs associated to truckloads hauling above normal to include feed, the livestock, and the value of water hauled. Supplemental Disaster Relief Program

By the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Farm Service Agency

The American Relief Act, 2025, provides disaster relief payments to producers who suffered revenue, quality or production losses to crops, trees, bushes, or vines due to qualifying disaster events. Drought losses must have occurred in a county rated by the U.S. Drought Monitor as having a D2 (severe drought) for eight consecutive weeks, D3 (extreme drought) or greater intensity level during the applicable calendar year. A list of counties that are eligible for SDRP due to drought for 2023 and 2024 is available.

Non-Insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program

By the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Farm Service Agency

The Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistant Program (NAP) provides financial assistance to producers of non-insurable crops when low yields, loss of inventory, or prevented planting occur due to natural disasters. Crops must be non-insurable and commercially produced agricultural commodity crops for which crop insurance is not available. [Learn More](#)

Tree Assistance Program

FSA provides funding for commercial orchardists and nursery tree growers suffering losses in excess of 15 percent mortality due to a natural disaster. [Learn More](#)

Conservation Reserve Program (Emergency Haying or Grazing)

By the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Farm Service Agency

Participants establish long-term, resource-conserving covers to improve the quality of water, control soil erosion, and enhance wildlife habitat. In return, FSA provides participants with rental payments and cost-share assistance. Emergency haying and grazing of CRP acreage may be authorized to provide relief to livestock producers in areas affected by a severe drought or similar natural disaster. [Learn More](#)

Livestock Forage Disaster Program

By the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Farm Service Agency

Producers apply through FSA to receive LFP payments for drought are equal to 60 percent of the monthly feed cost for a timeframe subject to the severity of the U.S. Drought Monitor rating in the county. LFP payments for fire on federally managed rangeland are equal to 50 percent of the monthly feed cost for the number of days the producer is prohibited from grazing the managed rangeland, not to exceed 180 calendar days. Environmental Quality Incentives Program– North Dakota

USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service can provide technical assistance during the recovery process by assisting producers to plan and implement conservation practices on farms, ranches and working forests impacted by natural disasters. Emergency Watershed Protection Program – North Dakota

Through the Emergency Watershed Protection Program, the USDA/NRCS may be able to provide technical and financial assistance where damage done by a natural disaster poses an imminent threat to life or property, or both. For example, if upland sites are stripped of protective vegetation by fire or drought, they may qualify for emergency work supported by the Emergency Watershed Protection Program. [Learn More](#)
